Carnegie Mellon University in Qatar graduates 80 students Graduates join 95,000 strong global alumni network

DOHA, QATAR – Carnegie Mellon University in Qatar celebrated its seventh graduation ceremony last night, bringing together dignitaries, family and faculty to recognize 80 graduates representing 24 different countries as they were awarded their diplomas.

As the sound of traditional Scottish bagpipes filled the Qatar National Convention Centre (QNCC), the graduates processed onto the stage, led by students carrying their programs' academic flag.

The biological sciences graduates were led by Kenneth Hovis, assistant teaching professor of biological sciences, followed by the business administration graduates, who were led by Sham Kekre, distinguished career professor, production and operations management. They were joined by the computer science graduates, led by Kemal Oflazer, teaching professor of computer science, followed by the information systems graduates, led by Selma Limam Mansar, associate teaching professor of information systems.

All 80 graduates—2 in biological sciences, 42 in business administration, 10 in computer science and 26 in information systems—now form part of Carnegie Mellon's 95,000-strong global alumni network.

Addressing the graduating class, and more than 1,200 distinguished guests, family members and friends, Subra Suresh, president of Carnegie Mellon University, praised the graduates for their achievements: "You have achieved something important, something that took time, discipline and willingness to persist in the face of difficulties. That is impressive, so savor the moment."

Consistently ranked among the top universities, Carnegie Mellon has more than 12,000 students, 95,000 alumni and 5,000 faculty and staff globally. In Qatar, students from more than 40 countries enroll at the university's world-class facilities in Qatar Foundation for Education, Science and Community Development's Education City, giving them a truly unique and multicultural experience.

Suresh continued: "This campus is itself an example of intentionally seeking out diversity. Carnegie Mellon Qatar has brought a distinctive flavor to Carnegie Mellon University as a whole, and over the past 10 years, this campus has opened the institution to new and innovative ways of teaching and learning. The two campuses together have created new opportunities for undergraduates to exchange knowledge, and to collaborate in new ways, this interaction has made us more successful as a global institution."

Ilker Baybars, dean of Carnegie Mellon Qatar, congratulated the graduating class, "Over the past four years, our students have worked hard not only towards their degrees, but also by contributing to the country's research efforts and by making a difference to society through community outreach in Qatar and overseas."

"We look forward to seeing the difference these young leaders will make to the community and market. The Class of 2014 join the university's high caliber alumni network who are making an impact through key roles with regional and international organizations, setting up their own businesses or joining graduate programs," Baybars added.

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Saleh Al-Raisi, a business administration graduate and the student speaker, acknowledged his fellow classmates at the ceremony: "We have all reached a new turning point. Together, we have learned and laughed, but most importantly we have matured together. The spirit of teamwork, whether in the classroom, students clubs or the student body government, has made us close friends, given us wonderful memories to cherish and has produced 80 exceptional graduates."

Al-Raisi, who served as president of the Qatari Student Association in 2011 and 2012, and as president of the Student Government in 2013, is currently participating in the 2014 Al Fikra National Business Plan Competition and hopes to go on to make a difference to Qatar's development as an entrepreneur.

Abdulla Saleh Al-Raisi, chief executive officer of Commercial Bank Qatar and proud father of graduate Al-Raisi said: "When Saleh was born I looked at him wondering what his future would hold. Today, I look at him with pride as he graduates from one of the top universities in the world, which has fulfilled my wish as a parent; to see him develop into a responsible individual. Thank you to Carnegie Mellon for contributing to the well-rounded individual I see before me today."

Academic Achievement Awards were presented to three students based on their outstanding academic performance: Haider Zali, business administration graduate, Fahim Dalvi, computer science graduate, and Haya Thowfeek, information systems graduate, received the awards.

Narcis Sadat Jafarian, who received the 2014 Andrew Carnegie Society Scholar Award, and the Qatar Campus Scholars were also recognized during the ceremony. This year's Qatar Campus Scholars were Jafarian, a business administration graduate, Syed Moosavi, a computer science graduate, Zali and Thowfeek.

Dean Baybars also recognized Matthew Szudzik, assistant teaching professor of mathematics, with a Meritorious Teaching Award. Marion Oliver, teaching professor of mathematics, was recognized as the 2014 recipient of the University Award for Outstanding Contributions to Academic Advising, which was presented to him on the Pittsburgh campus last month.

Senior Student Leadership Awards were presented to 13 exceptional students this year. These students showcased extraordinary leadership and made substantial contributions to the community during their time at the university.
